Damaging Winds and Tornadoes expected across western KY, more scattered I-65 & East

Key Messages

- A strong system will move across the Ohio River Valley today into Saturday
- **A damaging wind and tornado outbreak is expected across western KY late afternoon into evening (level 4 out of 5 threat)**
- **Central Kentucky** can expect more scattered instances of damaging wind and tornado threat late evening/overnight **(level 3 out of 5 threat)**
- **Eastern Kentucky** can expect a weakening severe threat with isolated damaging wind and brief tornado threat possible **(level 1-2 out of 5 threat)**

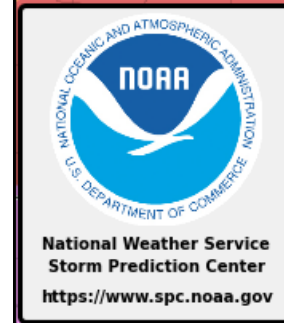
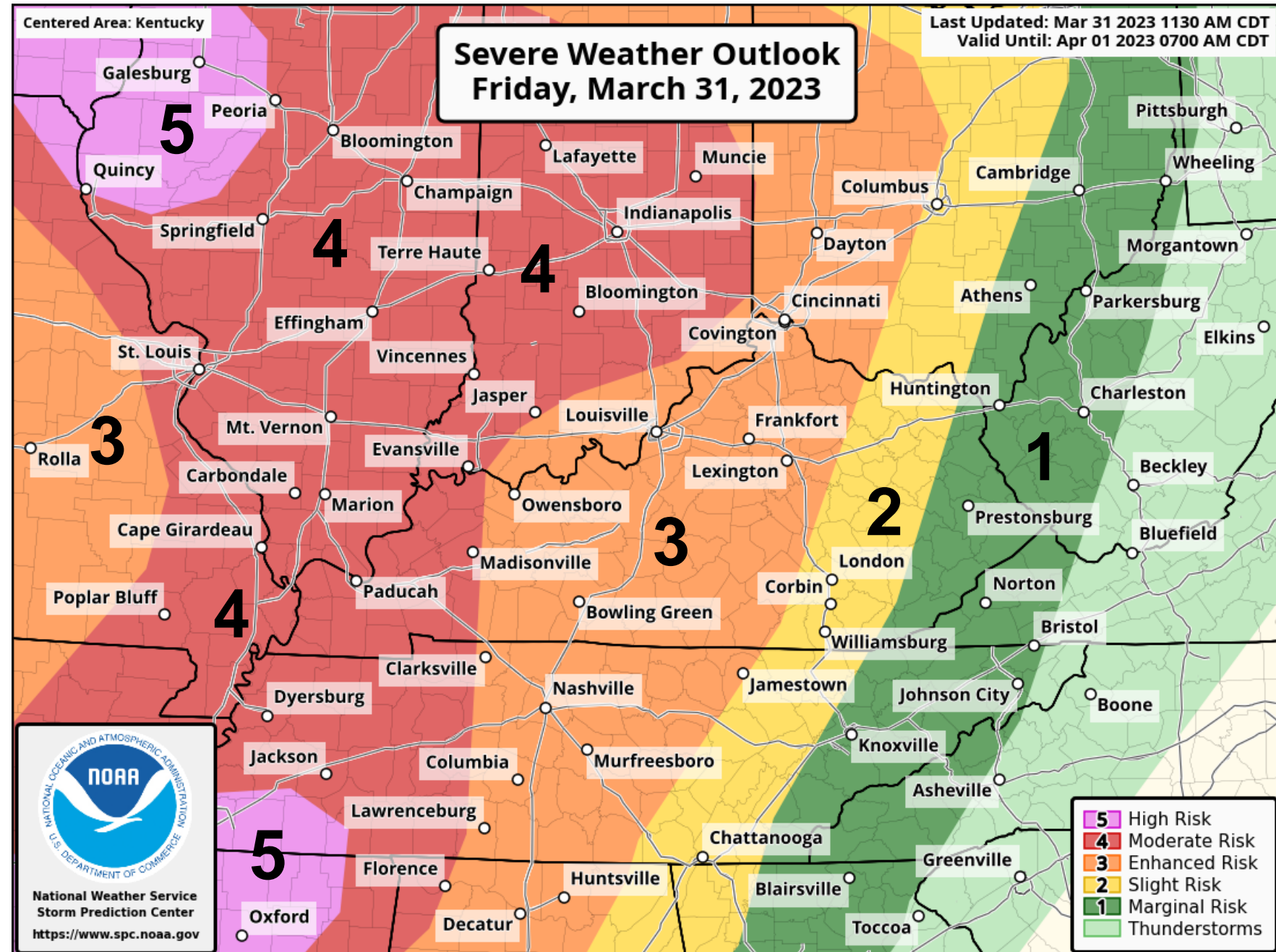

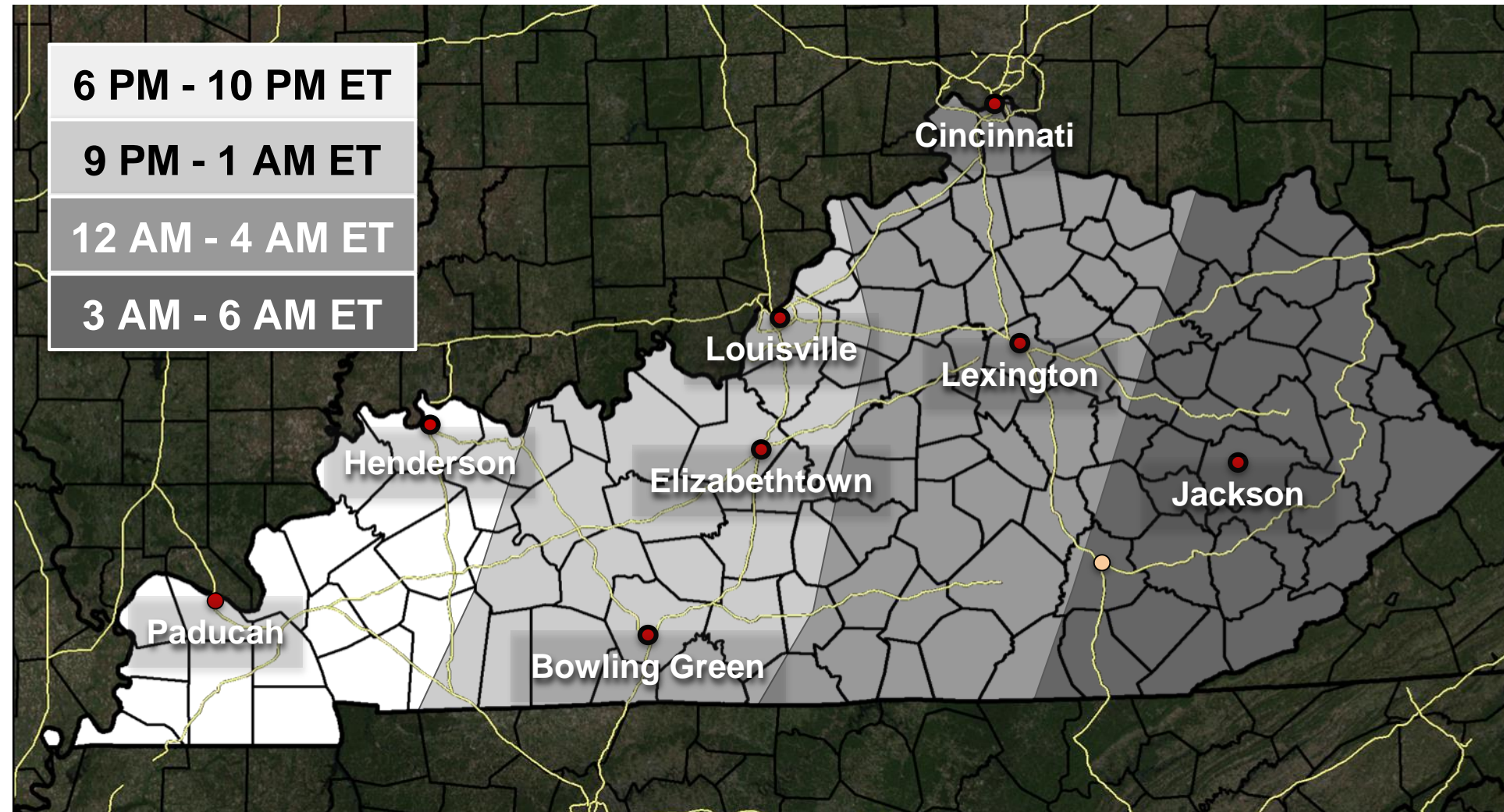

Severe Thunderstorms Tonight into Saturday morning

Details

- Storms will develop across far western Kentucky this afternoon and quickly race eastward tonight into Saturday morning.
- The strength and severity of storms is expected to gradually decline with eastward extent.
- Storms should push east of the state before sunrise Saturday morning.

Strong Non-Thunderstorm Winds

Gusts 55+ mph possible in the Kentucky Bluegrass region

Key Messages

- Non-Thunderstorm winds pick up out of the south and southwest Friday and continue into Saturday. The strongest wind gusts will likely occur Saturday morning
- Wind gusts of 40 to 50 mph will be possible during this timeframe, with isolated +55mph gusts.
- The strongest gusts will likely be across the Kentucky Bluegrass region.

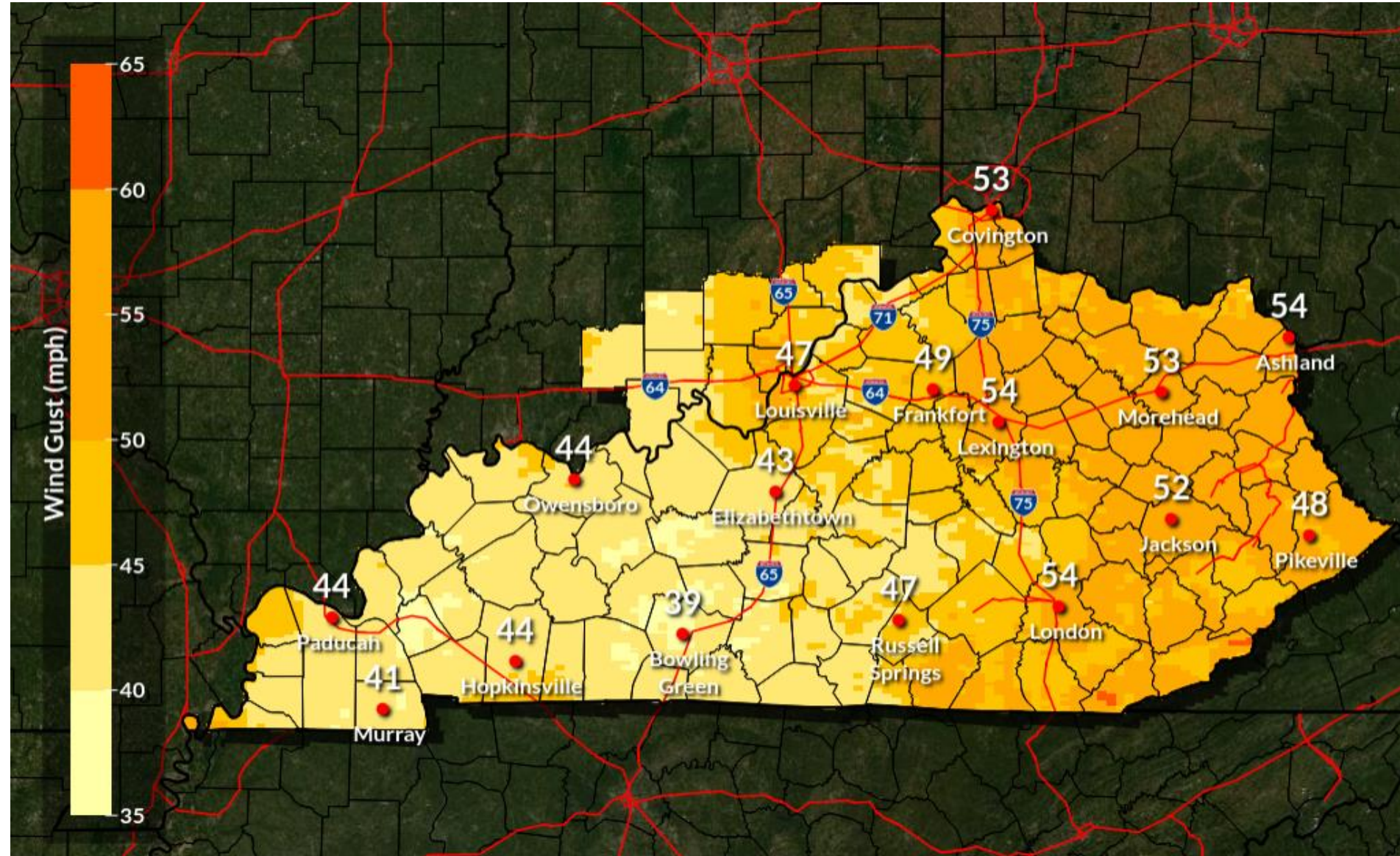

Tornado Sheltering Guidelines

Seek the best available refuge area **immediately** when a Tornado Warning is issued. Your chance of surviving a tornado is excellent if you follow these guidelines.

WORST OPTIONS

Mobile homes

Vehicles

Underneath a highway overpass

BAD OPTIONS

Large open rooms like gymnasiums

Manufactured housing

GOOD OPTIONS

Interior room of a well-constructed home or building

Basement

BEST OPTIONS

Above or below ground Tornado Storm Shelter
(NSSA/ICC 500 compliant)*

Specifically-designed FEMA Safe Room*

Stay in place until all clear

STORM PLANNING TIMELINE

A few days out

If the forecast calls for severe weather in a few days, start preparing now.



Make sure that you have emergency supplies



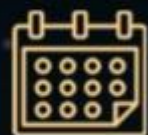
Know your safe places



Have a family communication plan

The day before

The day before, forecast accuracy continues to improve.



Adjust plans



Make sure your phone can receive WEAs



Ensure your shelter is clean and accessible

The day of

Remain vigilant and aware of any active Watches. A Warning may be issued at a moment's notice!



Remind your family of the communication plan



Know how to evacuate and/or get to safety from wherever you are



When a Warning is issued, you may only have seconds to take action!
